### CHAIRMAN'S/PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE:

The world of food and agriculture is exciting, dynamic and constantly reshaped by change elements-everything from market fluctuations and climate conditions, to new technologies and increasingly engaged consumers. Farm Foundation recognizes that serving this sector requires maintaining a sharp eye on how today's events will shape tomorrow's needs.

Preparing for the future is an exciting, often daunting challenge. That's a nice way of saying that most leadership boards-whether corporate, charitable or private-approach strategic planning with little anticipation. They know the end-product is vital for the life of the organization, but they also know the process can be a difficult one.

We take our hats off to the volunteers who serve on the Farm Foundation Board of Trustees and the Farm Foundation, NFP Board of Directors. In FY2017, they diligently worked through the strategic planning process with thoughtful comments, input and direction. The result is a dynamic document—The Farm Foundation Road Map—that will serve the organization well over the next five years. The Road Map is a compass for why we do what we do, how we will operate and the work we will pursue.

When Henry C. Taylor took over as the Foundation's First Managing Director more than eight decades ago, he identified four broad areas where the organization would seek opportunities to work: land ownership and tenancy; land utilization and conservation; farmer cooperatives; and national and international policies affecting agricultural production, marketing and income.

It is interesting to note that the areas of work identified by the Foundation leadership in FY2017 have striking similarities to Taylor's. Land ownership, use and conservation are now encompassed in resource management and stewardship. Building knowledge and leadership capacity expands Taylor's focus on farmer-led cooperatives and national policy. Understanding the evolving business climate no doubt includes national and international policies regarding production, marketing and incomes.

We consider these similarities a testament to the wisdom of Taylor and the founding leadership to focus the Foundation's work in very broad areas. Specific issues may come and go, but natural resources, human capital and public policies are, and likely will continue to be constants in the food and agriculture sector. With a deep appreciation for how those areas have evolved broadly, Farm Foundation is well positioned to help today's thought leaders explore the potential for the future.

To best achieve the goals laid out in the Road Map, it was necessary to do a complete review of our governance structure. Farm Foundation was created as a trust—an appropriate legal structure in 1933. But in the ensuing eight decades, changes in laws governing trusts and foundations made it prudent to review our structure.

As the 2017 fiscal year came to a close, the governance review was generating three major outcomes: The original Farm Foundation Trust is renamed the Legge Lowden Farm Foundation Trust, with oversight assigned to a six-member Board of Trustees. Farm Foundation, NFP, the

operating entity, is renamed Farm Foundation, with governance assigned to a 29-member Board of Directors. Both entities have fully revised and updated governance documents.



# PROGRAMS

Antimicrobial Education Project: In collaboration with the Animal Health Institute, Farm Foundation developed communication tools targeting small livestock producers with information on the Food and Drug Administration's revised Veterinary Feed Directive (VFD) rule, that took effect Jan. 1, 2017. A web page was built with VFD information resources, *www.farmfoundation.org/VFDrules*. An informational point of sale card was made available in print and electronic formats to educators and veterinarians, as well as to rural retailers throughout the nation, including Land O'Lakes, Growmark and Mid-States Distributing. The third tool was a series of radio interviews with government officials, veterinarians, feed industry representatives and retailers. Thirty-six radio stations aired the interviews in 32 states.

This project expanded the impact of work begun the previous year involving 12 education workshops on the revised VFD. Convened by Farm Foundation, those workshops provided unique opportunities for federal regulatory officials to talk directly with the livestock producers, veterinarians and feed suppliers impacted by the revised VFD. The conversations that resulted clarified some issues and raised questions about other points that remained unaddressed.



#### Partnering with NRCS: Farm Foundation has two

ongoing projects with USDA's Natural Resources Conservation

Service. Through an NRCS Conservation Innovation Grant, Farm Foundation is leading a three-year project to build a database on the economics of conservation practices, including cover crops, that promote soil health. The findings will help to enhance producer and land owner decision-making on conservation practices. This work complements work Farm Foundation continues to pursue with the Soil Health Institute on decision-making tools related to the economics of soil health.

The second NRCS collaboration is a multi-year program to gather input from land owners and producers about the impact and structure of conservation programs. Regional focus groups convened across the country provide an opportunity to engage producers as part of the Soil and Water Resources Conservation Act.

**Changing Dynamics of Farm Ownership & Agricultural Finance:** Partnering with USDA's Economic Research Service and Bank of America Merrill Lynch, Farm Foundation convened a workshop to explore the implications of changes in the landscape of farm ownership and agricultural finance. Farmers, lenders, and investors discussed such factors as the growing non-farmer investor interest in U.S. agricultural resources, implications of generational land transfers, the ability of young operators to access land, and farmer use of more diverse farm organizational tools to respond to the new business environment. How the changes may impact not only farmers and landowners, but local agribusinesses, lenders, rural communities and the structure of agricultural policies was also explored by workshop participants. Two papers commissioned for the workshop were published as *Farm Foundation® Issue Reports*: "Reconciling Farm Commodity Policy," and "Farmland Ownership: Trends and Future Implications."

**Global Perspective on Farm Size and Productivity:** Sustaining agricultural productivity growth is a key factor in the ability to feed the world's increasing population. Farm Foundation collaborated with USDA's Economic Research Service (ERS) to bring together economic researchers from Europe, Africa, Asia, Australia and the United States to expand understanding of the relationship between the size and structure of farm operations and agricultural productivity in different location and cropping scenarios worldwide. About 100 people, including those working in government, international development, finance and hunger/feeding programs, participated in the discussions. The workshop is part of a series of ERS-Farm Foundation collaborations to highlight aspects of agricultural productivity.

### FARM FOUNDATION FORUMS:

The 11th year of Farm Foundation<sup>®</sup> Forums provided opportunities for nearly 1,400 food and agriculture thought leaders to have meaningful conversations on issues ranging from trade to federal agricultural policies. In October 2016, the Forum hosted representatives of the two Presidential candidates, providing one of the few indepth exchanges of the candidates' perspectives on specific food and agricultural issues. The Forums take place at the National Press Club in Washington, D.C., but free audiocasting, made possible by a grant from Farm Credit, expands the audience across the nation.

# FARM FOUNDATION<sup>®</sup> ROUND TABLE

As a conversation catalyst, Farm Foundation engages great minds across the food and agriculture value chain in meaningful conversations and thoughtful debate to generate mindful decision making.

One example of this unique service is the Farm Foundation® Round Table, an invitational discussion group comprised of agricultural and agribusiness leaders from across the North American food and agriculture value chain. These leaders meet twice yearly to examine current and developing issues. Programs are designed to explore ideas, analyses and insights that participants may use in their own work.


Farm Foundation has administered the Round Table since the 1983 retirement of its founders, Charles Dana and Edith Thoman Bennett. The Bennetts originally helped bring together a diverse group of agricultural leaders to advise the Eisenhower Administration on agricultural policy development. Recognizing the value of exchanging ideas and discussions on timely policy issues impacting the business of agriculture, the leaders continued to meet on an informal basis. Those meetings evolved into the Round Table.

In June 2016, the group gathered in Louisville, KY, with program sessions examining the consumer trends reshaping the food and agriculture sectors. Over the two-day meeting, Round Table members examined issues and had perspectives challenged through presentations from and dialogue with agribusiness leaders, consumer advocates and academic researchers.

January 2017 found the Round Table in Orange County, CA, taking a first-hand look at the challenges and opportunities of urban agriculture—from farmers' markets to fields cultivated in a former Air Force base. Appropriately, the program sessions focused on resiliency and adaptation in the food and agriculture sectors.

In addition to the approximately 150 Round Table members, the membership rolls include about five dozen Honorary Life Members, individuals who have demonstrated their service to the Round Table and their commitment to the mission of Farm Foundation, NFP.

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
### **CULTIVATORS**

#### Cultivators - Leaders of the Future

Since June 2013, Farm Foundation<sup>®</sup> Round Table meetings have included as special guests upper class or graduate-level students in food and agriculture from accredited North American Land Grant universities.

The students' participation provides Round Table members an opportunity to engage the next generation of industry leaders. The students, who present information on their specific area of study, are able to interact with the diversity of agricultural and food system leaders who comprise the Round Table. A Round Table member volunteers to serve as a mentor for each student, further broadening the interaction of students with the professionals at the meeting. Conversations and meeting discussions are enriched by the perspectives of the students.

The January 2017 Round Table featured the eighth class of Cultivators, bringing to 48 the number of students who have participated since the program began. Students are nominated by their respective college Deans and selected by a committee of Round Table members to participate in each meeting. Funding to pay the student's transportation costs is provided through a grant from the CHS Foundation and support from Round Table members and their companies.
