

NRCS Has Field Offices Across the Nation





Rice Stewardship Partnership RCPP



- Ducks Unlimited and the Rice Federation are co-leads for the Rice Stewardship Partnership.

Combining the U.S. rice industry – represented by USARF – and the conservation community – represented by DU – is an aggressive approach to innovation, collaboration, and solution-oriented conservation.

Greenhouse Gas and Soil Carbon Markets

- Voluntary Participation in carbon and GHG markets provides producers with the opportunity to access a new revenue stream.
- Often referred to as carbon farm, working lands producers adopt NRCS conservation practices that enhance soil carbon stocks and reduce emissions from their operation.
- The atmospheric benefits are quantified and the producers free to receive payments for carbon benefits.
